Comrade James H Haughey

Who was born the Thirty first day of January A.D. 1847 in  
Millersburg County of Holma State of Ohio

I first entered the service at Shannon Ill Dec 25<sup>th</sup> 1863 and was mustered in at Freeport Feb. 24<sup>th</sup> 1864 as high private in the was rank of Co. J 46<sup>th</sup> Ill veterans Vol Infantry.

I was promoted to Corporal March 20<sup>th</sup> 1865, during Gen Cambys Campaign against Mobile which office I held until the close of war.

I was mustered out at Baton Rouge Jan 20<sup>th</sup> and received final discharge at Springfield Ill Feb 2<sup>nd</sup> 1866 at Camp Butler, as Uncle Sam Samuel had no use for us any longer.

My first battle was at Benton Miss May 13 1864. (2) Jackson Miss, July 5-6-7 1864 (3) Siege of Fort Spanish from March 21<sup>st</sup> to 31<sup>st</sup>. Had charge four days of a supply train sent to Gen Steels command April 4<sup>th</sup> joined the Division in front of Blakely participated in siege and the final charge of Blakely Apr 9<sup>th</sup> 1865.

Some of my most intimate comrades were Capt WW Diffenbaughm, Second Lieut T. E. Joiner Newton Lindsly Chambers Mc Murray, Samuel Riddle, T E Lowe, David Allison.

One of several important events was the scene of the explosion of thousands of tons of ammunition stored at the Mobile Magazine May 22<sup>nd</sup> 1865.
