Comrade Amos Hallock

Who was born the Seventh day of November A.D. 18 44 in

New York City County of \_\_\_\_\_ State of New York

I first entered the service at Chicago Ill. Apr 4<sup>th</sup> 1862, as private in Co. K. 65<sup>th</sup> Regiment Illinois Volunteers Infantry

I was first discharged Jan. 16<sup>th</sup> 1863 at Chicago, to re-enlist in the regular service.

I was transferred Jan 16<sup>th</sup> 1863 to Co C. 8<sup>th</sup> U.S. Infantry under Capt E.W.H. Reed. I was next discharged Apr. 16<sup>th</sup> 1865 at Lafayette Barracks Baltimore Md. by reason of expiration of service.

My first battle was at Harpers Ferry Virginia. (2) Battle of Wilderness was all through the Campaign down to Petersburg (3) Spotsylvania Va (4) Cold Harbor, crossing north of river (5) Bethesda Church. Explosion of mine at Petersburg July 30—1864

I was in a hospital in Chicago Ill. May 1862. Was also in a hospital in Washington D.C.

I was taken prisoner Sept 15—1862 at Harpers Ferry by General Jackson's Corps. of the Confederate Army. I was paroled on the field Sept-16—1862

My intimate comrades were John A Jones, Franklin E. Stewart, Albert Lambert, Edward Shepard, Joseph Nye, George Ryder, Hiram Wicks, Patrick Welch.

The most important events, was the assault on Petersburg and the battle of Wilderness
